Extract Based Questions

(b) Why was he worried?

(c) Which word in the above extract means the same as 'excessively'?

(d) Why was the author shocked?

A (a) "I" refers to the veterinary doctor who is the narrator of the story.

(b) He was worried to see the appearance of Mrs. Pumphrey's dog.

(c) 'hugely'.

(d) The author was shocked to see Tricki in the street.

Short Answer Type Questions

1 - Why did Mrs. Pumphrey make a frantic call to Mr. Harriot /

What was Tricki's ailment? How did it worry Mrs. Pumphrey?
